
Would you like to become involved if so, please speak to any of the people mentioned above at a Senior Tigers meeting, (if you don't know who we are ask Barbara) and we will be happy to chat with you. We will explain more of what's involved and we will be able to find something you can help us with. The use of a computer or the ability to take photos would be of benefit.

Next is an article put together by team member **Stuart Tomlinson** from a publication owned by collector **David Bond.** 

I have been a member of the Senior Tigers Memorabilia group for several years now and in that time, I have developed a range of skills that I didn't previously have. My speciality has become the scanning and editing of vintage broadsheet newspapers and Players Picture Cards taken from the scrapbooks of several collectors and preparing them so that we can display them on our website.

Whilst scanning collectors' items I have come across some very interesting information relating to our football club. One of these items was a brochure for a fete held over 4 days back in December 1927 at the City Hall in Hull.





The 70 pages mainly consisted of the exhibitors' adverts including a brand new four-door Morris saloon in blue or beige for £185 from the Paragon Motor Company and a lightweight pocket Mac for 21 shillings from the Asbestos & Rubber Company (now called ARCO). Amongst the various adverts, however, was a nine-page handbook that covered the Tigers' early years from 1903 to 1927. Those nine pages included a


mine of information about Hull City's early directors and players, financial information and the club's progress throughout the football league.

Although the idea of developing a football league club had been around for some time it was not until the 24<sup>th</sup> June 1904 that the Hull Daily Mail reported on the minutes of the annual general meeting of the East Riding of Yorkshire Football Association, which had been held the previous evening, that an announcement was made.

#### The Pioneers of the Hull City Football Club Ltd were:

(certified Marcus Andrews, teacher); **James** Barraclough, (ship owner); John Henry Bielby (builder); John Emmerson (assurance superintendent); Benjamin Saunders Frost Junior (fruiterer); William Gilyott (wharfinger); William Hay (advertising agent); Richard Henry Hobbs (manager); Frederick Arnold Levitt (furnisher and decorator); George W. Lilley, J.P. (surgeon); Ernest Morrison (advertising agent); John Ramster (club manager); Thomas William Shaw (managing clerk); Alfred Edward Spring (commercial traveller); and Percy Edward Wrightson (coal exporter). William Gilyott was elected chairman and Dr. George Lilley was vice-chairman.

William Gilyott was a prominent businessman based in Hull. He owned a large warehouse on the east bank of the river Hull close to the present-day Scale Lane bridge. He was also chairman of the

Grosvenor Hotel on Carr Lane which served as the unofficial Hull City headquarters and where the club held its AGMs for many years until it was bombed during the Second World War. He was also closely associated with the Hull F.C. (rugby club) as a chairman, director, shareholder and prominent supporter since the early 1890s.

It was something of a surprise, therefore, to see his name some 3 months later as the chairman of a brandnew local concern – and a sporting rival at that. Gilyott,

despite having no known affiliations or background in football, assumed a leading role in the affairs of this new enterprise. Whether he had decided to sever his formal links to the rugby club or whether he was asked to be chairman of a new football club is unknown. Whatever the reasons for his change of club and code, it seemed mutually beneficial to Gilyott and the fledgling new club.

As Hull FC's tenants, it made sense for City to have someone on the board who knew the workings of the rugby club directorate and who could foster a stable and secure relationship with them. Hull would be less likely to mistreat one of their former directors and maybe even be able to exert some future influence - sadly this proved not to be the case when it came to sharing the same football ground!

Despite his good connections, Gilyott was unable to broker the peace between the rival codes in the city as in March 1905 when the Northern Union pressurised Hull into locking City out of the Boulevard on the eve of an attractive friendly match against FA Cup holders, Manchester City. If the clock was ticking on City's residence at the Boulevard, unbeknown to Gilyott, it was also marking time on his chairmanship. The decision to seek a ground away from the interfering and obstructive Northern Union meant that City moved a few hundred yards away, on the other side of Anlaby Road, to the Circle, home of the Hull Cricket Club. As with the rugby ground, City needed to guarantee a smooth and conflict-free existence, and Gilyott made way for a new chairman, the wealthy Alwyn Smith, who was a director of City's new landlords, the Hull Cricket Club. Gilyott stayed on the board as vice-chairman.

The son of a Hull master mariner, and for many decades a dynamic figure in the city's port traffic, Gilyott had no known background in football and as such, it seems unlikely he had been in the social orbit of the other founders (ship owner James Barraclough excepted) or involved in any football networks. His formal connection with City ceased at the club's AGM in June 1909 when it was announced he would not be seeking re-election as a director due to his increasing business commitments. During the evening tributes were paid to Gilyott who responded in kind, shedding a little light on his time at the club and revealing the nature of his football background.

Clearly, not someone who had been fully immersed in the game's culture, he confessed he still had not completely understood the offside rule, even after 5 years as a director and expressed the wish that the club was promoted to the top tier as soon as possible as, in his opinion, they had not been sufficiently supported by the paying public in the Second Division. Gilyott made mention of 'Messrs Levitt, Barraclough, Bielby, Shaw, Crompton, Hay and others' who had brought Hull City into existence. This was a public acknowledgement of the instrumental roles played by a handful of the sixteen founder-directors. He again obliquely referred to his past involvement with Hull FC, maintaining that 'personally he should always retain a love of Rugger. It was a grand sport but he was bound to admit that Soccer was its equal, if not superior.'
